

Community Context

- Population of est. 4,200, located 25 minutes by ferry from Nanaimo
- 39% child poverty rate; 'hidden poverty'
- Strong culture of community care
- Barriers/lack of resources







- PHC is Gabriola's only social services non-profit
- Support individuals and families during vulnerable times in their lives, while strengthening community resilience
- 3 social determinants of health: Improving food security, reducing social isolation, and supporting academic success
- Run community and school food security programs

- Breakfasts, snacks & sandwiches
- Growing food on the 'Commons' with PHC for school and community
